

First Annual Mackler Scholarship Awarded

In June a newly funded BEF scholarship, the Scott A. Mackler, MD, PhD True Grit Scholarship, was awarded to Liam Griffin, a graduating senior who has demostrated true grit beginning in infancy. The Mackler award is in memory of Scott Mackler, a 1976 BHS graduate, and recognizes a student who has overcome significant adversity in his/her life. Dr. Mackler battled Lou Gehrig's disease for over 16 years while still

maintaining his quality of life and professional career.

Benefactors Harvey Mackler '71 and his sister, Randi Windheim, were on hand scholarship award night to present their scholarship to Liam.

On his scholarship application, Liam described how his complex medical condition has greatly shaped his life, physically and mentally. "I had my first stroke at 10 months old which affected the right side of body and my second stroke at 26 months, which affected the left side of my body," he wrote. "The constant battle against my condition in everyday life has taught me the importance of perseverance, adaptability, and (given me) a positive outlook on the future despite all the obstacles that I encounter daily."

BEF Grant Funds Student Book Club

"Social" Book Club helps students build community, critical thinking,

and a love of reading.

Fifth and sixth graders at Demarest School discovered the powerful academic and social benefits that can unfold through a student-led book club designed especially for their age group. The book club was funded with a grant from the Bloomfield Educational Foundation.

Accountability in Reading One of the driving goals behind the student book club was to build consistent reading habits. Students were selected not only based on their interest in reading, but also for their responsibility and commitment to at-home reading. With guidance from teachers, students made an informed decision to participate in the club and commit to weekly reading. "We had a big discussion early on about what this commitment meant," Mrs. Dana LaBattaglia, media specialist, explained. "It helped students take ownership of their participation."

Engaged and Reflective Reading Each student received and personalized their own reading journal in which to note ideas, reflections, or discussion points while reading. Initially led by the teacher, the discussions soon evolved to be student-driven. One student even began sketching comic-style illustrations of key scenes, sparking peer engagement and creativity. Students identified and brought up complex themes such as immigration, racism, poverty, and friendship conflict, demonstrating

thoughtful engagement with the material.

Building Confidence and Communication Skills The diversity of the group in terms of background, culture, and identity led to rich, respectful conversations. "At first, they were shy. But over time, they opened up and started respectfully debating and sharing perspectives," said LaBattaglia. The inclusive environment empowered students to express their views, challenge one another, and appreciate differing opinions.

Forging Friendships Beyond the Page Creating social connections was a core objective. The club intentionally brought together students who didn't typically interact during the school day. Through reading and discussion, they found common ground and new understanding. As the students bonded, they took ownership of their group. When the time came to welcome new members, students led a thoughtful nomination process, prioritizing group dynamics and inclusivity over social cliques.

"They saw that reading can be a shared experience that brings people together," LaBattaglia said.

"They learned about each other in ways they might not have otherwise."

The success of this student book club underscores the value of literature as a catalyst for personal growth, academic enrichment, and building bridges across differences.




